Deity was never referred to in the first place or because it has been deleted by case law.

DELEGATE BOYER: Delegate Rybczynski, I truly
don't know the answer to it. I can't say that it ever
has or has not been in any previous constitution. I see
Delegate Sickles rising. I wonder if he could clarify it.

THE CHAIRMAN: Delegate Sickles?

DELEGATE SICKLES: It is my understanding the current Constitution requires one who takes an oath must believe in the existence of God, but as a result of the Torcaso case this was held to be unconstitutional. Somebody is shaking their head.

THE CHAIRMAN: Delegate Henderson?

DELEGATE HENDERSON: I would like to ask, right along the line that has been suggested here, whether the Committee has the view that the non-believer, one who does not believe in God, which was the Torcaso case, would be permitted to assume office without taking this oath?

DELEGATE BOYER: I have an answer to that, but
I am going to yield if I may, Mr. Chairman, to Delegate
Blair, who was the Chairman of this Subcommittee.
