nature of a declaration or affirmation independent of the concept of being an oath; so I think that the question of the Ober Law so far as the voting today on the oath is concerned, is not of material import. I think it would be, however, important for us to determine the meaning and read the Supreme Court decision in the case insofar as it pertains to the retention of Article XV, Section 11 There the Article XV, Section 11, not of the Code Code. but the Constitution, I think that was enacted for the purpose of implementing the Ober Law; so it may be that when the Committee on General Provisions determines whether to retain in the Constitution Article XV, Section 11, which was the basis for the Ober Law, that at that time we can consider the constitutionality and the decision of the Supreme Court in ruling on the unconstitutionality of the Ober Law.

I think the Ober Law may decide that Article XV, Section II may not be necessary, and then again, it may be necessary for other purposes, but I think that will come when we meet it. I think the important question before us right now is the question of whether or not it is a need to consider the Ober Law in connection with the oath
