DELEGATE BOYER: The Chairman has correctly identified and interpreted that sentence. This does not intend to completely prohibit any further statutory legislation of a declaration. This would only eliminate the requirement for any additional oath or affirmation, as opposed to a declaration.

THE CHAIRMAN: Any other questions for purposes of clarification?

(There was no response.)

In further answer to Delegate Rybczynski's question of a few moments ago, I have had handed to me just now, sent for, a copy of the provisions of the Constitutions of 1776, 1851, 1864 and 1867 with respect to oath. That is, just the section which requires an oath. A very quick look at each one of them indicates that none in the oath section has made reference to a Deity. I would be glad to send this to you, Delegate Rybczynski, so you may look at it more carefully.
