

1 constitution which we may recommend.

2 This, however, is not at all the case. True
3 it is that the efficiency, the effectiveness of our govern-
4 ment will, in the final analysis, depend upon the people
5 we select to operate and conduct that government, but the
6 kind of people who are willing to undertake the task of
7 governing, and therefore the character of the government
8 itself, will be greatly influenced by the constitution
9 adopted by the people of our State.

10 We can attract to the legislature the most thought-
11 ful and capable of our citizens if we clothe the legisla-
12 ture with sufficient dignity, authority and power to
13 legislate properly, provide for a legislature which
14 can come to grips with the pressing problems of statewide
15 concern and solve them. We can induce our ablest citizens
16 to seek election as the chief executive of our State if
17 we grant to the executive ⁿbranch sufficient authority
18 and power to carry out the policies which a governor may
19 have been elected to put into effect. We can hold such
20 a chief executive responsible for his actions and those
21 of his appointed subordinates provided we give him power
