 affirmative presumption in favor of those reports, and consequently the Chairman cannot expect fidelity on the part of the majority of the members of his Committee with respect to the Committee reports.

I would hasten to point out, however, that despite this lack of a presumption and the lack of necessity for fidelity to the Committee report, that if the Committee of the Whole would seek to do what each of the Committees has done, to examine into the same detail, to reargue all the arguments, to set forth the full presentation of witnesses, that we would well be here until January, 1969, and consider ourselves lucky to go home at that particular time.

What I say here I say not for the purpose of being spared honest debate and reflection and consideration, but it does seem to me that the hundreds of hours that have gone into the consideration of these matters by the Legislative Branch, the careful consideration of the testimony of 68 witnesses which appeared before us in connection with these matt ers, the evaluation of questionnaires which were submitted to many persons who did not testify, certainly suggests that the decision and the
