passions of the moment are spent and before proper and full, calm deliberation can take place.

So it is quite true, therefore, that in addition to having bicameralism in our State's history and tradition by and large throughout our entire expanse from 1634, that we do have this opportunity to cool passion.

As was suggested in the Commission report, the two houses provide a technical review and tend to minimize careless legislation. A two house system also permits the graduation of a member from one house to the other, and I might say on some occasions the demotion from the Senate to the House.

It is not improper for me at this time to observe that in Dr. Michener's paper which you had laid before you it is said that the Maryland Senate was supposed to be compared somewhat to the House of Lords, and I think those of us who have served with former or present members of the Senate at this particular Convention can well attest to the strength of that principle, as has been shown in the testimony and the Committee debate here.
