

1 and eighth spot on the ballot may be filled, it is often  
2 filled by happenstance rather than intention on the part  
3 of the voter.

4 Under the single-district voter arrangement every  
5 voter in the state would have but one Senator and have but  
6 one delegate, so that he would address himself, particularly  
7 in the primary election, to selecting one of each and  
8 of course come the general election, you would have the  
9 typical head-on clash, between the two major parties of  
10 the District, but one would be in a position to know at  
11 all times who his one senator was, and who his one delegate  
12 was, so that there is no evasion of responsibility, so  
13 that one can know who is to be called upon for constituent  
14 services, so that one can evaluate and know where one's  
15 senator or one's delegate voted.

16 There is greater visibility, and greater  
17 responsibility placed upon the shoulders of those who serve  
18 in a single member district arrangement in both House and  
19 Senate than there is in those areas where you can get  
20 lost as one among eight or one among four, five, six, or  
21
