and eighth spot on the ballot may be filled, it is often filled by happenstance rather than intention on the part of the voter.

Under the single-district voter arrangement every voter in the state would have but one Senator and have but one delegate, so that he would address himself, particularly in the primary election, to selecting one of each and of course come the general election, you would have the typical head-on clash, between the two major parties of the District, but one would be in a position to know at all times who his one senator was, and who his one delegate was, so that there is no evasion of responsibility, so that one can know who is to be called upon for constituent services, so that one can evaluate and know where one's senator or one's delegate voted.

There is greater visibility, and greater responsibility placed upon the shoulders of those who serve in a single member district arrangement in both House and Senate than there is in those areas where you can get lost as one among eight or one among four, five, six, or
