features of reform that you envision were not adopted. In other words, may I ask you whether or not the recommendation for bicameralism is not predicated upon, first, your recommendation that the size of both Houses be decreased, and second, the belief that if you have the new legislature, it will reform itself to some extent by spreading the committee load, et cetera, and I suppose to pinpoint this question, may I ask you, sir, whether or not if these reforms are not adopted, or if we do not reduce the size considerably, is your committee still in favor of bicameralism?

THE CHAIRMAN: Delegate Gallagher?

DELEGATE GALLAGHER: First of all, I want to
thank you for characterizing the document as one that
seeks reform. I would say to the best of my ability that the
committee was in an agreeable frame of mind about bicameralism
because of these other features.

I would not on any given day, indeed at any given hour, suggest to you what the exact vote on bicameralism or unicameralism would be if some of these significant features were eliminated.
