3 think the game is worth the candle. For the more important
4 reforms which we seek in the end, I stake my case with
5 Woodrow Wilson, Earl Warren, and George Washington.

11 to speak briefly on the issue of the two-house versus
12 the one-house General Assembly. I appreciate and respect
13 the fact that the Committee on the Legislative Branch
14 voted 3 to 1 in favor of a two-house Assembly. I am afraid,
15 however, that this vote represents a failure to take ad-
16 vantage of an opportunity which may not come again for a
17 long time to move forward to a better system. That this
18 failure is largely the product of a human ingrained resis-
19 tance to change.
