2 in perhaps the most important deliberative body in Mary-
3 land to sit during the last one hundred years. Careful
4 attention is being given to every word for our work may live
5 another hundred years.

6 I would pose this question. Would anyone here sug-
7 gest that the work of this Convention be sent across the
8 hall to the Senate Chamber to have another elected body go
9 through the same process that we have just done? If
10 your answer is No, then I would suggest that you join us
11 in support of unicameralism. Thank you.

12 THE CHAIRMAN: Any delegate desire to speak in
13 opposition to the -- Delegate Byrnes.

14 DELEGATE BYRNES: I would like to, if I could,
15 Mr. Chairman, inject, I hope, a new thought into this
16 dialogue. Many of us concerned over the mounting, rapidly
17 mounting, intergovernmental relations problems we are facing
18 in all States -- have a great deal of difficulty adjusting
19 ourselves to regional aspects. We have a great deal of
20 difficulty adjusting ourselves in the national-state
21 relationships. I would suggest that is is possible in the
