2 indeed be responsible only to the needs of the
3 city adjoining the district of each individual legislator.
4 I submit, sir, there is an effective way to start the
5 new constitutionally created, aggressive, reapportioned
6 legislature. We should vest with them our vote of con-
7 fidence that they will be able to rise above the petty
8 indirection of their own body and decide what their own
9 proper size should be.

10 It is conceded by the Majority Spokesman that
11 there is no magic in numbers. It is conceded by the other
12 persons who have spoken that there is no ideal size. We
13 are not talking about a Senate of Rome. We are not talking
14 about a Senate, the precise specifications of which can
15 properly be written.

16 Say what you will, the last word on Baker ver-
17 sus Carr and its companion cases has not been said. No
18 major, sweeping constitutional revisions as fundamental
19 as this one has been released in its present posture.
