DELEGATE MOSER: Exactly as they are controlled now. Those basically are the powers they have now and they are controlled by law either of the General Assembly, the General Assembly I suppose.

THE CHAIRMAN: Delegate Mentzer.

DELEGATE MENTZER: In the case of WSSC, it has its benefits, Suburban Sanitary Commission, it has benefit charges but they are collected by the county, you are not setting up any separate collection agency. I see this as giving some sort of constitutional collection agency to these intergovernmental authorities and their bonds also are approved by the County Commissioners and by General Assembly, and I do not see where this carries through under this wording.

DELEGATE MOSER: That is the way they operate, but Maryland Port Authority operates in a different way. This is not intended, if this is your question, to change the procedure that is utilized with the Sanitary Commission. That is, still the same thing would follow there. But it is simply to permit what is now permitted. It is not intended as a change from existing law.
