has not given us any sanction power. We don't apparently have the contempt power, and there is no other provision of the statute which would in any way inflict penalties on anybody who ignored the regulations of this Convention with respect to lobbying.

In some quarters there is an argument that this Convention in effect being a repository of the sovereign people of the convention assembled could actually invoke contempt power, and I believe that Mr. Bamberger informs me over the long history of these things there are a few isolated cases on the point, but none of them are determinative and I for one would not suggest that we take the position that we have any inherent contempt power. I don't think it would be worth it, It would create more problems than it solves, so within the limitations, those limitations. the fact that we have no sanction power, we have done our best to propose to you a regulation which would assist the Convention in knowing with whom it is dealing. In the end then the only sanctions, aside from the Convention's power to exclude from appearances before

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
