

1 operating in the hopes that they can get these 276
2 commissions and bureaus and boards and agencies and every-
3 thing possible into somewheres around 16 to 18 different
4 principal departments.

5 With trying to give the Governor this power and
6 spell it out that he may go ahead and organize, we have also
7 tried to make sure that the principal departments were headed
8 by a single executive, with the exception of the school
9 board, and, of course, the school, the Department of
10 Education Board and any quasi-judicial board that might be
11 involved.

12 I think that we have recognized here, and there
13 is no point in my being very long-winded about it, that we
14 are moving in the right direction to a strong Governor and
15 he will ultimately be checked by both the legislature and
16 the judicial, but I do want to point out that one of the
17 foremost authorities has maintained that the biggest problem
18 with state government is that over the years, the Governor-
19 ship has not developed as fast as it might, and William
20 Young puts it in a very complete quote, I think, that the
21 development of the Governorship has proceeded from the
