

1 THE CHAIRMAN: Delegate Bothe, in view of the
2 statements by Delegate Willoner and your reply, the
3 Chair would like to ask a question or two for the infor-
4 mation of the Committee on Style.

5 Your amendment in lines 3 and 4 says "evidence
6 secured in violation of these provisions."

7 Can you indicate what is referred to by the words
8 "these provisions"? In other words, does it refer to the
9 whole of section 4, or does it refer only to lines 43 to
10 the end?

11 DELEGATE BOTHE: Mr. Chairman, it would refer
12 to the whole of section 4. However, as has been pointed
13 out by me and by Delegate Willoner, the possibility of a
14 private citizen being able to obtain a warrant is virtually
15 nonexistent.

16 THE CHAIRMAN: That is why I asked the question --
17 because the first part of section 4, as I read it, has
18 nothing whatsoever to do with warrants, and if your answer
19 is that evidence secured in violation of these provisions
20 means, for instance, an invasion of privacy as stated in
21 41, or interception of communications as stated in 39 and
