3 The purpose of bail now, tomorrow, and yester-
4 day was to allow a man under our system of juris prudence
5 who has not been found guilty to go free until he is.

6 Delegate Grant said there were a couple of con-
7 siderations about whether or not a man ought to be able
8 to go free on bail. One had to do with the finding of
9 guilt, and we did not reach it until a later date. The
10 other had to do with whether or not he is apt to be a
11 harm to his community, public peace, whatever that is. I
12 suggest to you that if we assume as we are supposed to
13 assume that he doesn't, that he didn't do that which he
14 has been accused of doing, there would be very little
15 doubt in most of our minds as to whether or not he should
16 be allowed to remain free until he is tried. I like this
17 amendment, the sense of it.

18 The part I don't like is the part about public
19 peace. I disagree with Judge Child and I disagree appar-
20 ently with some of this Convention who earlier
21 moved to strike the right of bail from the Maryland
