THE PRESIDENT: Delegate Gallagher?

DELEGATE GALLAGHER: Mr. President, the Committee on the Legislative Branch will meet this afternoon at 3:00 P.M. to hear the Honorable J. Glenn Beall, Jr., the Minority Leader of the House and Mr. Howard E. Denniss, President of the Young Republicans. I would urge all the members to be present because there is one other important matter we would like to take up at 3:00 P.M. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: Delegate Mudd?

DELEGATE MUDD: Mr. President, the Committee on the Judicial Branch will meet again this afternoon at 3:00 P.M., at which time we will have the privilege of hearing from Chief Judge Thomas J. Curley, and Associate Judge, Robert Heise of the People's Court of Anne Arundel County.

Tomorrow morning we resume hearings at 10:00 A.M., at which time we will consider Delegate Proposals No. 169 and 170 by Delegates Bennett and Beachley. At 11:00 A.M. we will consider Delegate Proposal No. 115 by Delegate Fornos; and at 12:00 noon we have the privilege of hearing from Judge Wilson K. Barnes of the Court of Appeals. Thank you.

DELEGATE MOSER: Mr. President, the Committee on Local Government will meet tomorrow morning at 9:30 A.M. and will then hear from Mayor Roger Moyer of Annapolis and other witnesses.

THE PRESIDENT: Delegate Kiefer?

DELEGATE KIEFER: Mr. President, the Committee on Personal Rights and the Preamble will meet immediately after this meeting to hear from Professor Tomlinson of the University of Maryland. Tomorrow morning at 10:00 A.M. we have with us Mr. LeRoy Clarke of New York City, another constitutional lawyer who will speak to us on the area of due process and equal protection.

Mr. President, I want to take this opportunity to apologize to those delegates who came over to our committee hearing yesterday afternoon prepared to testify or speak on behalf of the various proposals. I know Delegate White and Delegate Borom and Delegate Chabot were there. There may

have been others. We ran into a problem. Some delegates were unable to speak. We had intended the delegates to speak first and then Mr. Mazer who came from Baltimore City to follow up. However, after he arrived, it was learned he had to be back to Baltimore for a hearing of his Commission, and because he had been invited by members of our Committee especially to come down, we were in a jam. I want to assure every delegate that even though we have eighty-eight proposals before this Committee, we want all delegates to feel that they have an opportunity to come and tell us what they have on their minds with respect to their proposals. If we get into a jam, you will just have to bear with us. Everyone knows the limited amount of time we have, but we do want you to know, we want to be patient, understanding and give everybody a full opportunity to be heard. So if you get inadvertently overlooked, please contact us.

THE PRESIDENT: Are there any further announcements by committee chairmen? Delegate Fornos?

DELEGATE FORNOS: Mr. President, last June most of us spent three very lovely and enjoyable days at Goucher College, and I would like to take this opportunity to recognize the presence of forty young ladies from that institution in the galleries, and I hope they have as informative a time as we had at their institution with us.
