I would continue to vote against the committee recommendation—

THE PRESIDENT: Do you desire to submit it separately, then?

DELEGATE WILLONER: Yes.

THE PRESIDENT: Very well. The question now arises upon the adoption of the recommendations of the Committee on Style as contained in lines 31 and 32 on page 2.

Is there any discussion? Are you ready for the question? A vote Aye is a vote in favor of the recommendations of the Committee on Style in lines 31 and 32 on page 2. A vote No is a vote against.

Cast your vote.

*(Whereupon, a roll call vote was taken.)*

THE PRESIDENT: Has every delegate voted? Delegate James Clark?

DELEGATE J. CLARK: Aye.

THE PRESIDENT: Delegate James Clark votes Aye.

Has every delegate voted? Does any delegate desire to change his vote? Delegate James.

DELEGATE JAMES: I do not quite understand how to vote on this issue. Is a vote Aye to strike out the committee amendments?

THE PRESIDENT: A vote Aye is a vote which would be in favor of the recommendations of the Committee on Style, so that the sentence in line 31 would read, "No warrants shall be issued except upon probable..." A vote No would leave the language the way it was before those amendments were made.

Delegate Bothe.

DELEGATE BOTHE: I simply wanted to point out, as I hear some confusion around me, that a vote against the Committee on Style recommendation would place the language in conformity with the Fourth Amendment to the United States Constitution.

THE PRESIDENT: Does any delegate desire to change his vote? The Clerk will record the vote.

There being 47 votes in the affirmative and 70 in the negative, the motion is lost. The amendments are rejected.

The question now arises upon the adoption of the amendments suggested by the Committee on Style in Committee Recommendation R&P-1 and R&P-2 with respect to all sections other than section 1.05, but including the change in the caption on section 1.05, lines 23 and 24, on page 2.

A vote Aye is a vote in favor of these Style Committee amendments; a vote No is a vote against.

For what purpose does Delegate Rybczynski rise?

DELEGATE RYBCZYNSKI: I want to make sure this 1.12 amendment does not slip by.

THE PRESIDENT: Do you have it?

DELEGATE RYBCZYNSKI: I believe Delegate Smith has the thing worked up.

THE PRESIDENT: Delegate Smith.

DELEGATE M. SMITH: It is in the process, Mr. Chairman. I do not know whether you call it style, or whether you call it substance. I thought you had held it to be substance.

THE PRESIDENT: What I said was it was an amendment perhaps of style but it did not pertain directly to the amendments submitted by the Committee. If that is still the case, it is not necessary to put it now. You will have the opportunity.

Are you ready for the question? The question arises on the approval of the recommendations of the Committee on Style as to all sections of Committee Recommendation R&P-1 and R&P-2 except section 1.05 but including the caption of section 1.05. A vote Aye is a vote in favor of the amendments submitted by the Committee on Style; a vote No is a vote against. Cast your votes.

THE PRESIDENT: Has every delegate voted? Delegate James Clark?

DELEGATE J. CLARK: I vote Aye.

THE PRESIDENT: Does any delegate desire to change his vote? The Clerk will record the vote.

There being 114 votes in the affirmative and 1 in the negative, the motion is carried. The amendments are adopted.

Delegate Marvin Smith, if you could be having somebody type up your memorandum while we are considering other sections, I think it would be very helpful.

DELEGATE M. SMITH: It is in process, Mr. President.
