

to assume this responsibility. I am glad to note in passing that the attorney general has now been restored to its rightful position in authority here, and he comes forth immediately stating that he will be willing to make a study and so others in this delegation have stated that they would like to study it further.

I do not know what we have been doing here all this time if we have not studied this simple proposition and determined once and for all that instead of the State taking people's property or damaging it and not paying for it, we are now going to pay them what they should have been receiving for the last one hundred years, no matter what it cost.

THE PRESIDENT: You have one half minute, Delegate Anderson.

DELEGATE ANDERSON: So I urge that this amendment be defeated.

THE PRESIDENT: Any other delegate desire to speak in favor?

Delegate Clagett.

DELEGATE CLAGETT: Mr. President, I wonder if the sponsor of the amendment would yield to a question.

THE PRESIDENT: Delegate James, do you take the floor to yield to the question? This will be the last time you will take the floor, if you do.

DELEGATE JAMES: I will try.

THE PRESIDENT: Delegate Clagett.

DELEGATE CLAGETT: In line 7 would you be amenable to striking the word "any" and inserting the word "reasonable"?

THE PRESIDENT: Delegate James.

DELEGATE JAMES: That would be acceptable to the sponsor if that is acceptable to my co-sponsor, Delegate Adkins.

THE PRESIDENT: Delegate Adkins, did you get the suggestion?

DELEGATE ADKINS: Do I understand it to be to insert the word "reasonable" between "any" and "limitations"?

THE PRESIDENT: To insert the word "reasonable" in place of "any".

Is that correct?

DELEGATE CLAGETT: Strike the word "any" and insert the word "reasonable."

DELEGATE ADKINS: I am only one of sixteen, but I would have no objection since I think that is within the concept.

THE PRESIDENT: Do any of the other co-sponsors on Amendment No. 4 object to the modification of the amendment by striking the word "any" in line 7 and inserting the word "reasonable"?

Is there any objection from any delegate to considering the word so modified?

There is no objection. The word "any" in line 7 is stricken. The word "reasonable" is inserted.

Is there any further discussion?

*(There was no response.)*

Are you ready for the question?

*(Call for the question.)*

The Clerk will ring the quorum bell. The question arises on the adoption of Amendment No. 4 to Committee Recommendations R&P-1 and R&P-2 as amended by Report S&D-9. A vote Aye is a vote in favor of the amendment. A vote No is a vote against.

Cast your vote.

Has every delegate voted?

Delegate James Clark.

DELEGATE J. CLARK: I vote Aye.

THE PRESIDENT: Delegate James Clark votes Aye.

Does any delegate desire to change his vote?

The Clerk will record the vote.

There being 76 votes in the affirmative and 45 in the negative, the motion is carried. The amendment is adopted.

The next section to which the Chair has any amendments sponsored by the requisite number of delegates is section 1.17. As to this section, the Chair has five amendments, some of which have fifteen sponsors, some of which have fewer. It seems to the Chair that the orderly procedure would be to put these amendments in the following order: first, Delegate Hostetter's Amendment A which would strike the entire section. Then Delegate Marvin Smith's Amendment P which would strike the word "procedural", then Delegate Kiefer's and others' amendment. I will not put that next. Instead, Delegate Hostetter's Amendment N which would add a phrase in the
