His Ma^{ties} Justices of the Peace, being made sensible of the necessity of a bridge to be made over the wading place at the head of Monobin River. humbly taken into their deliberate consideration the want thereof. Have therefore ordered that Cap. David Brown. m^r Roger Woolford and m^r Stephen Lyffe. do employ and order workmen to build a bridge over the aforesaid wading place. and the wages of the men as they shall think reasonable for the County's service the wages to be paid out of the County's Treasury.

The same day - - -
It was ordered by their Ma^{ties} Justices of the Peace that m^r James Bounds and m^r Stephen Hopkin do employ workmen to amend the great bridge at Hawsaenga being at the head of Lorumbe River the said workmen to be paid out of the County's Treasury according to agreement made by the aforesaid Bounds and Hopkin.

The same day.
James William Dredshaw and Petitioner the Cor. Court that he might have the keeping of the ferry boat at Lorumbe, which formerly belonged to Jn. Henderson which was granted upon condition that Henderson do give, would not keep it any longer. and that likewise the said Dredshaw would keep a good causey to & from for which Causey James Smeyster became security. and m^r John Boul did affirm at that time that he heard John Henderson say that he would not keep the ferry any longer.

The same day.
Alexander Thomas. and upon complaint made to the County's full Court that Thomas Colman ferryman of Wintonstow, that he had abused him self and utterly forsaken the ferry, and gone away in y^e said Alex. Thomas's debt. and that he the said Alexander had employed a man twenty days to Officials in Colman's stead and place. and therefore humbly petitioned for an Order for his debt. and the said Alexander likewise petitioned that he might have the keeping of the aforesaid ferry, which ferry was granted him upon security given by m^r Aust.

The same day the Court ordered that Alexander Thomas should have allowed upon the ferry amount three thousand pounds of Cobans due to him and Colman.

The same day this following Petition. was preferred to the Cor. Court. To His Ma^{ties} Justices of the Peace for y^e County of South - - - The humble Petition of John Crispshaw sheweth. - - - That your Petitioner hath by y^e providence of God lived of sixty three years and now is fallen very lame in his limbs and in very low condition and therefore humbly prayeth that your Ma^{ties} will have serious consideration y^e disability of your Petitioner's health and prayeth your Ma^{ties} will be graciously pleased to give him a pension of y^e sum of £100 per year.
