2d:

A. Did apply; I went before them, they told me to take the oath; I said I thought I wouldn't take it; three weeks after I went back, took the oath and answered all the questions except one. Mr. Hayman, one of the Registrars, told me he couldn't make me answer it, so I went out. A few days after I found I was a legal voter; saw it in the published list. On the morning of the election, I started to town, and found a gentleman, who told me I was marked off, and was not a legal voter. Was notified of no charge; was confronted with no witnesses.

3d:

A. Did vote in the evening; voted for John R. Franklin.
4th. Waived.

Cross-examination:

To the first interrogatory:

A. I can't say I felt any way, I had one son in the Northern army and one in the Southern army.
