1st. Where do you reside?

A. In Potato Neck District, No. 11.

2d. Were you or not examined before the Board of Registration of that district, upon the question of the right to registration as a qualified voter of Francis M. K. Boggs? If yea, state what was your testimony.

A. I was summoned before the Board, I didn't know what for. I was asked if I had had any conversation with Francis Boggs on the war? I told them I had, and we differed, but I never heard Mr. Boggs say any thing I considered disloyal. That was the whole of my testimony to the Board, as well as I can remember. They were the exact words.

Cross-Examination:

1st. Did you, upon that occasion, or any other, when you were present before the said officers of Registration, observe anything in their conduct which would lead you to suspect or doubt the honesty, impartiality and fidelity of said officers in the discharge of their official duties.

A. No, sir; I did not.

The above has been read read to me and is correct.
