After answering all their questions, as I supposed satisfactorily, I called their attention to a rumor that I had given Thomas Humphreys of F., a dollar to go to Virginia, who then explained that the dollar I gave him was for wages due him from me, and that I didn't know he was going to Virginia, and requested them to summon Thomas Humphreys to testify concerning the matter, which they would not do; I went before the board several times to see if they had any charge against me; they never told me of any charge, and I didn't know there was any against me.

1st.

A. I don't think I did to any person.

2d.

A. I don't think I did to any person; only in general terms that I was sorry for the war.

3d.

A. Don't remember that I did.

4th.

A. I did, at the last; at the end of the war.

5th.

A. In general terms, I was sorry that men were killed in either army.

6th. Have your sympathies or not throughout the war been with those who were in armed rebellion against the Government?

A. If you mean sympathies for their success in dividing the Government, I have not; I have never seen the time yet that I have ever wished the country divided; always been opposed to it.
