A. Did apply. I applied on the two last days of their sitting. Mr. Fusey asked me if I had made up my mind to take the oath; told him I had. He told me it was not worth while to ask me all those questions, as he believed I was a Union man at the breaking out of the rebellion. I said I was and am yet. He said he knew I had heard all those questions; that it was not worth while to ask them all, and he asked me two, which I answered.
