Gravener (one of the Registers,) said, you must give two loyal men for your security for your loyaltyship; then I told him I should do no such thing, that they could cheat me out of only a few years if I didn't get to vote; they said no more to me; but I spoke to Mr. Holten, before I left, I said to the Registers enquire of my neighbors about me; I said to Mr. Holten, I wish a word with you; I want to know what objections you have to me, said he, any person that is not for us is against us; he knew well I was a Democrat.

3d.

4th. Waived.
