Cross-Examination:

To the first interrogatory:

A. No, sir; I had very little to say over it. I was selling goods under the Government and was afraid to express myself.

2d.

A. I was very sorry for it, because I thought it would make a bad country for us.

3d.

A. Not at all, except that I was sorry for the men that were killed on both sides.

4th.

A. If I had a choice I should say I was for the South, out I didn't aid or assist them any.

5th and 6th. Waived.

Re-direct Examination.

To the filed re-direct interrogatory:

A. No, sir; never did.

The above has been raad to me and is correct.
