3d.

A. Didn't vote; should have voted for Franklin. 4th.

A. Nothing more than I have testified to; but that was the general talk in the neighborhood, that they didn't intend to register any except those who voted with them.

(To this answer the Contestant objects.) 5th.

A. Some sixty were excluded, and at least some one hundred deterred from applying for Registration because they didn't think it was of any use, from the conduct of the registers, to apply; I have been much in the politics of this district, and am very familiar with every part of it.

Cross-Examination:

To the first cross-interrogatory:

A. I have no recollection of making any remarks about it; I have been very cautious in making remarks during the whole war.

2d.

A. I felt sorry that Fort Sumter was fired on by the rebels, because I wanted more time for a settlement, and I was opposed to the war from the beginning to the end.

3d, 4th and 5th. Waived.

6th.

A. I had sympathies for persons on both sides, but I did not desire the entire overthrow of the Government; I mean I wanted a restoration of the Union.

The above has been read to me and is correct.
