The Board of Trustees consists of the Governor, the Comptroller, the Treasurer, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Delegates, the Attorney-General and the United States Commissioner of Agriculture, ex-officio, and one person appointed by the Governor, with the consent of the Senate, from each Congressional District of the State. The appointments are made two biennially for six years from the first Monday in May. (Chapter 326, 1888).

## STATE HORTICULTURAL DEPARTMENT. College Park, Maryland.

Chapter 289 of the Acts of 1898 creates a State Horticultural Department, which consists of a State Entomologist, a State Pathologist and a State Horticulturist, who shall be respectively the professor of Entomology, the professor of Vegetable Pathology and the professor of
