Answer. I do not know what the law says on that head.

Seventh Cross-Interrogatory. Have any suits been brought against you for refusing to receive votes at the election held in District No. 10, Allegany county, Md., Nov. 6, 1866; if so, how many?

Answer. There are so many I cannot recollect.

Eighth Cross-Interrogatory. How many Radical and how many Conservative votes were polled in District No. 10, at the election held November 6th, 1866?

Answer. To the best of my knowledge sixty-nine Radical votes were polled, and thirteen Conservatives.
