

such action thereon as he might think necessary for maintaining the peace of the city,

Mr. Latrobe prepared the orders for the release of the Commissioners, Messrs. Young and Valiant. The order in the case of Mr. Valiant is given; that of Mr. Young being similar.

In the matter of the petition of Wm. T. Valiant for habeas corpus, Judge Bartol, of the Court of Appeals of Maryland:

Ordered, this 13th day of November, in the year 1866, that the petitioner be discharged from the custody of the Warden of the Jail of Baltimore city, on the commitment in default of bail in the sum of \$5,000, and that he be discharged from the same custody, under the commitment on the order requiring bail in the sum of \$20,000, upon his giving his own recognizance in the sum of \$5,000, conditioned for his appearance before the Criminal Court of Baltimore City to answer the charge of conspiracy therein depending against him.

The bond given by the Commissioners in their own recognizance, upon the charge of conspiracy, to answer before the Criminal Court, reads thus:

“Know all men by these presents, that I, James Young, am held and firmly bound unto the State of Maryland in the sum of five thousand dollars, to be paid to the said State or to its certain attorney, to which payment, well and truly to be made and done, I bind myself, my heirs, executors and administrators firmly by these presents. Sealed with my seal, dated the 13th day of November, 1866.

“The condition of the above obligation is such, that if the said James Young shall well and truly appear before the Criminal Court of Baltimore city, to answer the charge of conspiracy therein depending against him, shall be void and of non-effect.
