Ordered, That the Librarian be directed to furnish the clerks of this House with the same extra stationery as furnished to the members.

On motion of Mr. Parsons,

Ordered, That it be entered upon the Journal, that if Mr. Parsons had been present yesterday he would have voted "aye" upon the resolutions as amended, relating to President Johnson and Governor Swann.

Mr. Neilson submitted the following order :

Ordered, That six thousand copies of the documents accompanying the Governor's Message, be printed in the English language, and four thousand in the German, the translation of the latter to be made by Frederick Raine, Esq., of Baltimore.
