

The bill entitled, an Act to repeal the seventh, fifteenth, sixteenth and twentieth sections of the 4th Article of the Public Local Laws of the city of Baltimore; relative to the qualification of Electors in said city, and regulating the time for holding election for Mayor and Members of the City Council, and the terms of and the times for entering upon the duties of said office, and to reinact the same with amendments,
