

Answer. They said there were charges against me, but did not say what they were. I was registered as a qualified voter in September, 1866; I don't know whether or not I asked the Judges what the charges against me were.

3d Question. How did those armed men demean themselves?

Answer. Two stood at the door of the election room, and some five or six a short distance off; they made no use of their guns, because there was no occasion for it; they did not deter me from voting; the election, while I was there, was perfectly peaceable.

4th Question. Is it customary in District No. 10 for men to carry their guns in the fall of the year, in the game season?

Answer. It is; I have seen guns at elections before, but not so many, nor were they used in the manner they were that day; I never before saw men at elections with pistols buckled around them; it is usual when men bring their guns with them to elections, for the purpose of hunting on the way, for them to set them in the corner, or out of the way, but this time they held them in their hands.

Re-examined by Mr. Devecmon:

1st Question. What do you think the guns were brought there for?

Answer. My opinion is, they were brought there for the purpose of preventing Conservatives from voting, had the Conservatives insisted on voting.

Cross-examined again by Mr. Brown.

1st Question. Why did you not register in 1865?

Answer. Because the men appointed to register I did not like; one of the registers lost his wife by death; a few weeks after he married his late wife's sister, and she had four children; one of said children was a mulatto, and I swore such a man should never register me.

WM. H. KITZMILLER, being duly sworn deposed and said as follows, to wit:

By Mr. Bevecmon:

1st Question. What is your name, age, residence and occupation?

Answer. My name is Wm. H. Kitzmiller; age 34, live in
