Under the Factory Inspection Law or "Workshops and Factories," Code 1904, Acts 27, Sec. 243, the number of inspections made in the City of Baltimore in 1922 was 1.548, compared with 1.660 in 1921; 27.865 persons were found employed in 1922, compared with 24,023 in 1921.

Under the Boiler Inspection Law, Article IV, Public Laws of Maryland, "Baltimore City Code," pages 196 to 203, which applies only to Baltimore City, there were 54 inspections made of boilers for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1922, that do not carry insurance. Under the Board of Boiler Rules, Chap. No. 676, 1920 Session of the General Assembly there were 297 inspections made during the same period, 158 of which were in Baltimore City and 139 were in the counties. The total receipts from inspections under both laws was \$1,835.13 in 1922, compared with \$1,617 in 1921, and the total amount received from insurance companies under the Boiler Inspection Law was \$1,235 in 1922, compared with \$1,303 in 1921.

Under the Mining Inspection Law 1902, Chap. 124, the total tonnage of coal and clay mined in the State for the fiscal year ending May 1, 1922, was 1.688.095.1, compared with 3,479,153 in 1921. There were 5 fatal and 265 non-fatal accidents in the mines during 1922, compared with 7 fatal and 280 non-fatal in 1921.

The number of strikes during the calendar year 1922 was 12, compared with 11 in 1921, 21 in 1920; 22 in 1919 and 37 in 1918.

By the Act of 1920, Chapter 676, a Board of Boiler Rules was created consisting of the Chairman of the State Bureau of Labor and Statistics, who shall be Chairman: the Attorney-General and the Chairman of the State Industrial Accident Commission.

This Board is created for and charged with the duty of formulating rules and regulations governing the proper construction and installation of boilers of over fifteen pounds to the square inch, for sale or use in this State and to enforce such rules and regulations and the continued maintenance of them on a basis of proper safety.
