## PROPOSED AMENDMENTS SINCE 1867

Proposed by Act of 1874, chapter 364. Art. IV, § 8: Cases can be submitted to court without aid of a jury, and referring

to the removal of cases.

Proposed by Act of 1880, chapter 417. Art. IV, § 5: Election of judges and filling vacancies.

Proposed by Act of 1890, chapter 194.

Art. II, § 17: Submission of bills passed by General Assembly to governor to sign or return with his objections within six days or it is law.

Proposed by Act of 1890, chapter 195.

Art. III, § 48: Corporations may be formed under general laws but not by special act.

Proposed by Act of 1890, chapter 242.

Declaration of Rights, Art. 15: Uniform taxes and institutional exemptions.

Proposed by Act of 1890, chapter 255.

Art. VII, § 1: Election of county commissioners.

Proposed by Act of 1890, chapter 362.

Art. XII, § 3: Board of Public Works authorized to sell State's interest in works of internal improvement.

Proposed by Act of 1890, chapter 426.

Art. III, § 51: City or county can tax personal property of its residents but not on mortgages.

Proposed by Act of 1892, chapter 313. Adds § 39 to Art. IV: Additional judge to the Supreme Bench of Baltimore can be created by act of General Assembly

and provide for his election.

1896

Proposed by Act of 1896, chapter 459. Adds § 11 to Art. XV: Appointment to

civil service to be made on merit system.

Proposed by Act of 1900, chapter 185.

Art. V, § 9: Fixing compensation to state's attorneys.

Proposed by Act of 1900, chapter 432.

Art. III, § 4: To reapportion representation in House of Delegates.

Proposed by Act of 1900, chapter 469.

Art. III, § 2: To increase legislative districts in Baltimore City.

Proposed by Act of 1908, chapter 26.

Art. I, § 1: Titled "Elective Franchise," relating to qualification of voters, etc.
