

Same for electors of president and vice-president of the United States—

The judges shall cause a certificate of all the votes given in the districts to be enclosed, sealed up, and directed to the governor, &c.—

They shall (in case of elections for delegates to the general assembly, or for electors of the senate,) cause the return, enclosed as aforesaid, to the governor, to be addressed to the chancellor, to be by them delivered—1805, ch. 97, sec. 19, 522

Copies of the certificates to be sent to the governor by the county clerk—1805, ch. 97, sec. 20, 522

The governor on receiving the returns of electors to choose the president and vice-president, and for members of congress, to ascertain the votes given for each, and thereupon declare by proclamation, signed by the governor, the names of the persons elected—1805, ch. 97, sec. 33, 525

Where two or more candidates have an equal number of votes, the governor to determine on the election by lot—1805, ch. 97, sec. 34, 525

Stamp paper directed to be furnished by the treasurer to the offices of banks, not chartered by the state, under the direction of the governor—1817, ch. 156, sec. 1, 679

A license from the governor required for a broker, as to bank notes and lottery tickets—1818, ch. 210, 701

To furnish the treasurer of the western shore with blanks for licenses to retailers of spirituous liquors, retailers of spirituous liquors at horse-races, to hawkers and pedlars, and marriage licenses—1824, ch. 148, sec. 2, 814

To procure an entire set of the proceedings of the conventions previous to the formation of the state government, and of the legislature, and lodge the same with the clerk of the court of appeals—1825, ch. 78, sec. 1, 830

Authorized to draw upon the treasurer of the western shore, not exceeding \$5,000, annually, on account of the education, &c. of indigent deaf and dumb persons—1827, ch. 140, 935

To appoint a librarian, &c.—1826, ch. 53, 871

Not to remit the part of any fine to which any informer may be entitled, under any law of the state—1828, ch. 129, sec. 17, 964

No nolle prosequi to be granted by him, but upon condition, that the costs of prosecution be paid by the party to whom granted—1832, ch. 155, 1079

In case of extra session of congress, to issue his proclamation for an election of representatives, if necessary, in the opinion of the governor—1832, ch. 275, sec. 5, 1087
