Leave was granted to the Committee on Internal Improvements to introduce a bill entitled a Supplement to the Act entitled an Act to incorporate the Dorchester and Delaware Rail Road Company, and to direct the payment to the said Company of the sum of money pledged by the Act passed at January session, 1860, chapter 303, to works of internal improvements in Dorchester county, passed at January session, 1866, chapter 52.
