Sir:—In obedience to an order of the Senate, this day passed, requesting me to inform your Honorable Body "the amount of money which appears to be due to Howard county from the Academic Fund allowed each county," I have the honor to report that there has been withheld from the Patapsco Female Institute, from 1860 to 1867 inclusive, the sum of \$800 per year, making in all \$6,400. The probable retention of this appropriation was caused by the sum of \$15,000 raised by lottery under the Act of 1842, chapter 5.
