BY THE SENATE,

February 7, 1868.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates:

We propose, with the concurrence of your Honorable Body, that a joint special committee of three on the part of the Senate, and four on the part the House, be appointed, to whom shall be referred all propositions looking to a removal of the Tobacco Warehouses of the State from their present location.

We name on the part of the Senate Messrs. Grove, Parker, of Calvert, and Snyder.
