Thomas, having voluntarily given aid, countenance and encouragement to persons engaged in armed hostility to the United States, is not entitled to take the oath of office as a Senator of the United States from the State of Maryland, or to hold a seat in this Body as such Senator; and that the President pro tempore of the Senate inform the Governor of the State of Maryland, of the action of the Senate in the premises.
