

FRIDAY, March 13, 1868.

The House met, and was opened with prayer by the Rev. Mr. Cronin.

Mr. Jordan presented the petition of Dr. Wm. N. Martin, David R. Carlyle, Jacob H. Christ, and 47 other citizens of Uniontown, Carroll county, asking this General Assembly to grant them a revival of their corporation charter for the village of Uniontown, (granted 1860,) with such amendments as to enable them to collect fines.
