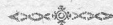
CHAP. 23. Notwithstanding the general extension of the statutes relating to house-breaking, or larceny from the house, there is reason to believe that this was not among them.

It was applicable in part to a species of larceny called in England *shop-lifting*, which was not likely to be much practised in the province, and no case has been found of a prosecution that appeared to be under this statute; nor is there anything to shew that the provisions respecting certificates to the prosecutors of felons, and pardons to the discoverors of two or more were in use in the province.
