NOTES.

CHAP. 27. It is evident that this statute related to offences committed in England. The persons guilty, were for the third offence to be transported.

CHAP. 33. Related to the sugar colonies.

CHAP. 34. Neither this statute, nor the one referred to, ever extended to the province. This offence was thereby ousted of the benefit of clergy; but all the prosecutions therefor in the province were under acts of assembly which made it punishable by four-fold and whipping.
