

that instead of the words "any subject," they used the words "any free person, servant, apprentice, or slave," and added the offence of cutting off the nose or lip. The punishment was also the same, to wit: death, as in cases of felony, without benefit of clergy; but with a power in the court to change it to being adjudged to serve and labour on the roads.
