This Bureau consists of the Governor, who is Chairman; Secretary of State, Comptroller of the Treasury, State Treasurer, Chairman of the State Roads Commission, Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, Chairman of the State Board of Welfare, Chairman of the State Board of Health, State Superintendent of Public Schools, President of the University of Maryland, and the Superintendent or managing heads of the following institutions: Crownsville State Hospital, Eastern Shore State Hospital, Rosewood State Training School, Spring Grove State Hospital, Springfield State Hospital, Maryland Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Maryland State School for the Deaf, Montrose School for Girls and Maryland Training School for Boys.

The Chairman of the Bureau appoints a Secretary-Treasurer who shall be known as the Purchasing Agent.

The Central Purchasing Bureau of Maryland was established in consequence of an act passed by the Legislature of 1920 (Chapter 184, 1920). The Bureau was organized in June, 1920, and immediately took over the purchasing of all State Departments, Boards, Institutions and Commissions with the exception of the State Roads Commission. In 1935 the Bureau took over the purchasing for the State Roads Commission.

During the last fiscal year, purchases in excess of \$5,000,000.00 were made.
