

Mineral Production, 1955—Sand and gravel, 9,694,928 short tons, value \$12,210,638; stone, 5,342,968 short tons, value \$8,800,044; coal, 512,469 short tons, value \$2,001,743; lime, 74,497 short tons, value \$669,228; natural gas, 3,116, millions of cubic feet, value \$626,000; miscellaneous, value \$11,027,986.

Baltimore Port—In 1955 the port handled 15,458,134 long tons of imports and 7,368,750 long tons of exports. In total tonnage, Baltimore ranks as the second port in the country. Chief imports are ores, oil, fertilizer, sugar; exports are grain, coal and metal products.
