The Office of the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles was established by Chapter 207, Acts of 1910. The Commissioner, who is a career employee, serves as the Director of the Department. Because of the rapid growth in the responsibilities and duties of the Department as a result of the steady increase in both motor vehicle registrations and the number of motor vehicle operators, the Department of Motor Vehicles was reorganized along functional lines in 1960 and 1961 to serve the public better.

Division of Examining and Licensing

Major John Satterfield, Director

The Division of Examining and Licensing examines all applicants for motor vehicle chauffeurs', motor vehicle operators', and motorcycle licenses in the State, requiring them to demonstrate successfully their visual acuity, their knowledge of Maryland's motor vehicle laws, and their ability to operate a motor vehicle or motorcycle. The Division conducts examinations at Departmental headquarters at Glen Burnie and at the twenty-two other locations throughout the State. Each operator must renew his license every two years and all applicants must be eighteen years of age or older. Those applicants who are sixteen and seventeen years of age can be issued licenses upon the successful completion of a course in driver education approved by the State Department of Education or by the Department of Motor Vehicles.

The Professional Driving School Section of the Division has the responsibility for the licensing and regulation of driving schools in
