The Delmarva Advisory Council, originally called the Delmarva Steering Committee, was recommended at the Delmarva Development meeting held in Salisbury on December 3, 1963. The meeting was attended by the Governors and representatives of Maryland, Delaware and Virginia. As a result of this meeting, the Council was established in 1964 to advance the economic and cultural welfare of the people of the Delmarva Peninsula through advice, counsel and assistance to such government agencies and private organizations as are concerned with programs and activities to develop the resources and economic activities of the area. At a second Governors' Conference held on May 11, 1967, the Delmarva Peninsula was designated by the U. S. Department of Commerce, the Economic Development Administration, the Delmarva Economic Development District under the terms of the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965.
