The Administration develops and implements programs to provide clean air. The Administration develops air resources management plans and program strategies. It develops and enforces regulations for control of emissions from stationary and other sources. It also maintains a statewide comprehensive air monitoring system to provide current information on ambient pollutant levels in order to institute regular and emergency procedures for their control.

The Administration works through two programs: Engineering and Enforcement, and Technical Services.

The Air Quality Control Advisory Council originated as the Air Pollution Control Council in 1963 (Chapter 806, Acts of 1963). It received its present name in 1967 (Chapter 143, Acts of 1967). Formerly under the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, the Council was placed within the Department of the Environment in 1987 (Senate Bill no. 671). The Council advises the Department on proposed rules and regulations for the control of air pollution in the State.

The Council consists of not more than fifteen members appointed by the Secretary of the Environment. Three members represent the general public. Additional members include a physician, a professional engineer chosen from a list submitted by the Baltimore section of the American Society of Chemical Engineers, a chemical engineer chosen from a list submitted by the Maryland section of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers, and two persons employed in a manufacturing or public utility business in Maryland chosen from a list submitted by the Maryland Chamber of Commerce. One member is a member of the Regional Planning Council recommended by that Council. One member is appointed from a list submitted by the Maryland Association of Counties. Four members are selected, one each from lists submitted by the Presidents of the University of Maryland, The Johns Hopkins University, the Maryland State-D.C. AFL-CIO, and the Chairperson of the Board of Directors of the Council of Governments of Metropolitan Washington. Terms of members are five years, except for the member representing the Regional Planning Council who sits only as long as the duration of membership on that Council (Code Environment Article, secs. 2-201 through 2-206).
